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CCXCVIII Turkdean Parish Register, etc By Frederick Biscoe, MA

CCXCVIII. — **TURKDEAN PARISH REGISTER**, **ETC.** ——The old register of this parish, in which the earliest entry is of a baptism in 1572, contains some noteworthy particulars:—

"xii. Die Julii, 1643. Mrd quod die et Anno sup^a dict., Ego, Roulandus Wylde, Cler'us, dedi Thome Wilde, cler'o, realem, actualem, et corporalem possessionem eccl'ie parochialis de Turkedeane, in Conu. et Dioces. Glouc. in omnibus suis juribus, membris, et pertinentiis comsis in pidia [?].

Thome Warde, Rowland Wylde
William Elbrowe, Rector de Stowe,
Anthony Arkell. In Com. Et Dioces.
Gloces."

"Mrs Mary Coxwell was buried on the 22 May, 1683, in linnen contrary to statute, whereof Rowland Corbett was the informer, and rec^d 50s. of the forfeiture. The other 50s he p^d in the Ch: Porch to the overseers of the poore on the next Sunday following." [See No. CCII, p. 187.]

"Mr Robert Coxwell was buried on the xxvijth day of February, 1683 [1683-4], in linnen contrary to the statute, whereof Rowland Corbet was the informer. The 50s. that was due to be p^d to the overseers M^r Henry Coxwell himself p^d to the poore on Easter Eve, 1684, in the Church porch, as followeth: to Goodman Curtis, 15s.; to John Cook, 15s.; to Widdow Collet, 10s.; to Widdow Freeman, 10s.; w^{ch} was allowed by the parishioners."

"Mrs Lenna Coxwell, wife of Mr Henry Coxwell, Gent, was buryed in woollen only December ye 26th, 1700." On a stone in the chancel there is this inscription: -- "Here lieth the Body of Leanna, wife of Henry Coxwell, and youngest daughter of Paul Dodwell, Gent, and the Lady Ralleigh. Buried Decem. ye 26th, 1700. Also Mary, third daughter of Henry and Leanna. Coxwell, Janry ye 12, 1700."

1718. "Dame Elizabeth Nelthrop was buried in Linnen contrary to Act of Parliam^t, for w^{ch} y^e Penalty was paid to y^e Poor of y^e Parish y^e 14th day of April." Within the communion rails there is a stone with the inscription: — "Here lieth interred the Body of Dame Elizabeth Nelthrop, wife of the Hon^{ble} Sir Montague Nelthrop, Bar^t, eldest daughter of Henry Coxwell, Gen^t, buried Ap. y^e 14, 1718."

1720. "Sir William Banastre, Knight, late Baron of ye Exchequer, was buried in woollen Jany 19th. Cert: ye 26th." He also was buried within the church; and there is this inscription to his memory on a large blue stone:-- "Here lieth interred the body of Sir William Banastre [two lines illegible], one of the Barons of the Exchequer in the reign of Her late Majesty, Queen Anne, who departed this life the --- of January, 1720, in the 69 year of his age."

The Banasters and Coxwells seem to have been the chief families in the parish. On an oak door of a bedroom in a house now occupied as a farmhouse and belonging to Edmund Waller, Esq., there is this inscription :-- "William Banastre, Anno 1588." Of the name (which, according to Rudder, was Bannister) there are four different spellings in the register - Banaster, Bannaster, Bannastre, and Bannastre.

"The Vicarage House was rebuilt in the year 1733, by Henry Massey, Vic."

"The Yew in the Church-yard was planted in the year 1736." At the end of the marriages the following lines, which would be more appropriate after the burials, occur: --

" Nacsimur et morimur ; sors haec certissima vitæ ; Sic animas cœlum, corpora pulvis habet."

There are three bells in the church tower. One of them, which is very old, bears this inscription: -- "Æternis annis resonet campana Johannis"; and the others are of the 17th century, and were cast at Burford. - Frederick Biscoe, M.A., Turkdean Vicarage, Northleach.
